### THE FEI CODE OF CONDUCT

### **FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE**

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

- 1. At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
- 2. Horses and Athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
- 3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.
- 4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.
- 5. The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.

6. DRAW:

To take place on 10.12.2013 – at 1:30pm in the Sociedade Hípica de Brasília

Three draws will be required; one for the Starting Order, one for the Horses and one for the Teams. The first draw should be to pair the athletes with the horses. It is the OC's responsibility to provide the balls with names of athletes and horses and the numbers, as well as the bowls for the draw. All athletes and their representatives must be present for the 3 draws. The exact time of the draws will be established by the OC and communicated



to all involved. The draws must take place well in advance of the first training session.

#### **Draw for Horses**

This Draw will take place in two separate stages. The first stage will determine with which of the 2 horses each host athlete will compete. The names of the host athletes should be listed alphabetically and the names of their 2 horses prepared. A separate draw for each athlete will take place. The names of both horses are placed in a bowl and the President of the Ground Jury picks one name. This will be the horse with which the home athlete will compete. The remaining horse's name should be placed in a separate bowl ready for the second stage of the draw.

For the second stage of the draw two bowls are required. All of the names of the remaining horses (that have not been drawn by the home athletes) will be placed in one bowl. The names of the foreign athletes will be placed in another bowl. The President of the Ground Jury picks an athlete's name from one bowl and a representative from the OC or the host NF picks a horse's name from the other bowl until all horses and athletes have been drawn.

#### Draw for the order of starting

Once the draw for the horses has been completed the second draw will take place. This time, the host athletes' names are placed in one bowl and the odd numbers from one to thirty-two are placed in the other bowl. The top placed foreign athlete in the final rankings picks an athlete's name from the bowl and a host athlete (to be chosen by the OC/NF) picks a number from the other bowl until all names and numbers have been drawn. The same is repeated for the foreign athletes, but this time the even numbers from one to thirty-two are placed in a bowl. Once all athletes have been drawn the starting order for the warm-up competition is established.

#### Draw for the teams

The names of all the host athletes are placed in one bowl, and the names of the foreign athletes in another. The top placed foreign athlete in the final rankings picks one name from the host athlete bowl followed by the President of the Ground Jury , then a host athlete (as for the draw of the starting order) picks one name from the foreign athlete bowl followed by the OC or NF representative. Four athletes make up one team, 2 host athletes and 2 foreign athletes. The process is repeated until all 8 teams are created.

#### VI. INVITATIONS

Number of Home athletes to be invited: 16
Number of Foreign athletes to be invited: 16

Foreign athletes to be invited as per Art. 3 of the FEI Rules for the Children's International Classics Final 2012 :

Thirty-two athletes will be qualified to participate in the Final: 16 athletes from the host country (or host region – to be defined in consultation with the OC and FEI – should there not be enough suitable athletes from the host country) and 16 foreign athletes.

The 16 foreign athletes selected to participate are the best placed 10 athletes on the Gold Tour final standings list on the 1st of November 2012, plus the best Gold Tour athlete from each FEI Group not already represented in the best 10.

If the total number of foreign competitors cannot be filled according to the above system, competitors will be selected in descending order of the final overall individual classification (maximum 2 participants per foreign NF).



The FEI will notify foreign athletes of their qualification through their NF.

The host country is responsible for the selection of its own athletes.

With the exception of the host country (or host region), no country shall be represented by more than 2 athletes.

One groom per athlete.

### VII. FACILITIES OFFERED

#### 1. ATHLETES

Additional accommodation is available upon request for accompanying persons and is at their own expense. All reservations should be made through the OC. Should athletes not accept the accommodation probed by the OC, any alternative accommodation must be at their own expense.

The FEI will subsidise the travel costs (economy class) of qualified foreign athletes. Foreign athletes will be responsible for purchasing their own flight ticket, but the FEI must give its approval of ticket costs prior to the purchase of the ticket. Notification of approval for the purchase of tickets will be given by the FEI to the NFs of foreign athletes.

#### 2. GROOMS

Requests for accommodation must be sent with entries.

Cost of accommodation will be at the cost of Home Athletes from 09.12.2013 to 16.12.2013.

Meals: at Home Athletes expense from 09.12.2013 to 16.12.2013.

#### 3. OFFICIALS

The travel expenses of the FEI Technical Delegate and the FEI Course Designer will be covered by the FEI. The expenses of the other FEI and OC appointed officials will be covered by the OC.

#### 4. HORSES

This event will be organised with borrowed horses. Each host athlete will provide 2 horses. A draw will be carried out for each participant of the host country to determine which of his/her horse he/she will ride (ref. Art. 6 of this schedule). In addition the OC will provide a further 5 reserve horses in case of injury, illness or incompatibility of horse and athlete.



### **5. VISA REQUIREMENTS**

Foreign athletes and accompanying persons should submit a scanned copy of the passport along with a coloured photo to the FEI (<a href="mailto:anna.williams@fei.org">anna.williams@fei.org</a>). The OC and the FEI will be responsible for assisting as necessary for all visa needs however it will be the athletes' (and accompanying persons) responsibility to organise their own visas.

## 6. LOCAL TRANSPORTATION - ARRANGEMENTS FROM HOTEL TO SHOWGROUNDS

Local transport will be arranged for athletes, accompanying persons and officials to and from the airport, and to and from the hotel/show ground.

#### 7. WELCOME

Foreign athletes should arrive no later than 10.12.2013. All athletes (home and foreign) must be in attendance for the draw. Participants will be met by officials of the host NF at the following airport:

#### VIII. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

#### 1. ADVERTISING AND PUBLICITY ON ATHLETES AND HORSES:

The Athletes are authorised to carry the logo of their personal sponsor in accordance with Art. 256.3 and 257.3 of the FEI Rules for Jumping. The Chief Steward will check that the advertising and publicity on Athletes and horses complies with these Articles.

#### 2. STARTING ORDER

#### Warm-up Competition

The order of starting in the warm-up competition is according to the initial draw (ref. Art. 5.2):

1st Host athlete2nd Foreign athlete3rd Host athlete4th Foreign athlete etc.

#### 1st Qualifying Competition

For the 1st Qualifying Competition the starting order will be the reverse order of starting in the Warm-up competition.

#### 2nd Qualifying Competition

Competitors will commence with start number 17 from the 1st Qualifying Competition (17 to 32, followed by 1 to 16).



#### Final and Farewell Competitions

The starting order for the Final and Farewell Competitions will be in the reverse order of points received in the 1st and 2nd Qualifying Competitions. In the event of equality of points for any place, the starting order will be decided by taking into consideration the best time in the first round of the 2nd Competition of those athletes concerned.

#### 3. POINTS SYSTEM

Athletes placed 1st to 16th are qualified for the Final Competition. Those athletes not qualified for the Final Competitions are to take part in the Farwell Competition.

The following point system will be used for the 1st and 2nd Qualifying Competitions to determine which athletes will qualify for the Final competition. The winner receives points equal to the number of athletes in the competition, plus one point. The 2nd placed competitor receives points equal to the number of athletes, minus one. The third placed competitor will receive points equal to the number of athletes, minus two, and so on:

Example with 32 starters:

1<sup>st</sup> 33 points 2<sup>nd</sup> 31 points 3<sup>rd</sup> 30 points 4<sup>th</sup> 29 points etc.

In case of a tie among athletes for any place in the 1st Competition, points are added together, divided by the number of competitors concerned and distributed equally among those in question (fractions up to 0.5 are rounded down, fractions of 0.5 and above are rounded up).

For the 2nd Competition the results of the Jump Off count for the distribution of points. If there is a tie for points among competitors following the 1st and 2nd Qualifying Competitions, the results of the 2nd Qualifying Competition count and if there is a further tie for points among the same competitors the results of the 1st Qualifying Competition count.

#### 4. GENERAL CLASSIFICATION AT THE END OF THE COMPETITIONS

#### <u>Individual Classification</u>

Prizes in kind will be distributed during the prize giving ceremonies following each competition (to be supplied by the OC). The FEI will provide FEI Medals for the overall winners (Gold, Silver and Bronze in the Final Competition) and an FEI Medal for all participants placed  $4^{th}$  to  $10^{th}$  in the Final.

### **Team Classification**

Teams of four athletes will be formed by a draw (ref. Art. 5.3). Teams will be placed according to their score in the 1st and 2nd Qualifying Competitions, excluding the jump-off in the 2nd Qualifying Competition. Each team has one drop score in each round, providing the team has four competitors. In case of a tie on penalties for any place, the times of the best three athletes of each team in the 2nd Qualifying Competition will be the deciding factor.

#### 5. FALLS

The first fall of an athlete eliminates the combination from the competition. However, the combination may compete in further competitions and will receive a score of 20 penalties more than the worst score in the competition in which he/she was eliminated. No points may be given in the competition where the fall took place.



#### 6. SUBSTITUTIONS OF HORSES

The OC must provide at least 5 horses in the case of injury or illness or in the case of incompatibility between horse and athlete. Injury and illness must be verified by the FEI Veterinary Delegate. Horses may only be substituted in agreement with the Ground Jury. In the case of substitution of horse, points may not be carried forward. If a substitution is made between the 2nd Qualifying Competition and the Final Competition the competitor in question may only take part in the Farewell Competition.

Should a substitution be necessary then a draw shall be held to decide the horse to be ridden. All names of the substitute horses should be put in to a bowl and the President of the Ground Jury picks a horse's name. This horse will now be ridden by the athlete requiring a substitute horse. A further substitution involving the same athlete is not allowed.

#### 7. DRESS

Dress is in accordance with the rules for International Jumping Events. It is compulsory for participants to wear long boots.

#### 8. TRAINING SESSIONS

There will be two 30-minute stewarded training sessions: the first the day of the Draw, the second the day of the Warm Up Competition. Both training sessions are compulsory. No more than six obstacles may be jumped in total during any training session. Cross poles are not included in this amount. Three attempts at jumping an obstacle count as one obstacle jumped. One double or one triple counts as one obstacle. The horse's trainer or any other person, providing he has received the owners' authorisation, may school the horse during the 30-minute training period. If the trainer jumps the horse, the number of times jumped will be deducted from the number of times permitted for the athlete to jump his horse during the training session. Horses must be ridden with the bit in which they are usually worked and presented at the time of the draw. The bit may be changed only with the agreement of the owner. The Ground Jury must be informed of any such changes.

#### 9. AGE OF ATHLETES

This Final is open to children from the year in which they reach the age of 12 until the end of the year in which they reach 14 years of age. It is the responsibility of NFs to ensure that their athletes are of the correct age. Proof of age will be requested and verified before the event commences (if the Final is held in the year after the qualifying competitions athletes that have qualified but who are no longer of the correct age at the time of the Final will be permitted to take part in the Final, that is those born in 1999).

### 10. INSURANCE

All owners and athletes are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

The FEI insures all FEI Officials, whose names are published in the FEI Officials lists, against third party liability including Judges, Course Designers, Technical Delegates, FEI Stewards, FEI Veterinary Delegates, Para Classifiers, Members of the Judges' Supervisory Panel and FEI Coaches (FEI MCP Veterinarians are covered under a different policy):



- Who are acting for or on behalf of the FEI as stated in the approved schedule of the Event or who are acting in the scope and course of the FEI's Business as described in the final approved schedule; and
- Who have received the status of FEI Officials at FEI Events through a qualification process.

The FEI will NOT insure:

- National officials officiating at FEI Events; and/or
- FEI Officials, who have no official function at the Event.

The insurance extended is for any liability that the FEI Official incurs to a third party, and for the costs of defending any such claim arising as a result of actions undertaken by the FEI Official in good faith (including errors and omissions) on behalf of the FEI. However, the insurance for obvious reasons does not extend to any liabilities incurred as a result of an FEI Official's dishonest, fraudulent, malicious, and/or illegal act.

Should an FEI Official become aware of an incident that he or she believes might result in a claim, that FEI Official should notify the FEI immediately and provide all of the facts known to the FEI Official. The FEI cannot guarantee the insurance coverage described above in circumstances where the FEI Official has good cause to believe that there might be a claim and does not provide such timely notice directly to the FEI.

### 2. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

#### **GENERAL**

In accordance with the FEI Code of Conduct it is imperative that all Horses at FEI Events are physically fit and free from infectious disease before being allowed to compete.

#### **ENTRY OF HORSES**

#### 3. <u>NATIONAL REQUIREMENTS</u>

In accordance with the FEI Code of Conduct it is imperative that all Horses at FEI Events are physically fit and free from infectious disease before being allowed to compete.

#### 4. TRANSPORT OF HORSES

Horses must be fit to travel and be transported in vehicles suitable for the transport of horses. Any government requirements for disease testing and control must be requested well in advance, and the Horse be in compliance by the time of arrival at the border of the country where the Event is taking place. Athletes, or their representatives, have a responsibility to be in compliance of national legislation in both the country of origin, return, and the host nation of the Event; where necessary Athletes must contact local government authorities or veterinary advisors for information regarding animal health requirements and transport legislation. Within the European Union (EU), this includes EU Council Regulation (EC) No 1/2005 concerning the protection of animals during transport within the Member States of the EU.



### 5. <u>VENUE ARRIVAL INFORMATION & FITNESS TO COMPETE</u>

Please note that it is not necessary for horses competing at this event to be in possession of an FEI Passport. However, please note that the FEI Flu vaccination requirements must be adhered to and all horses must be in possession of a fully recognised National passport with a clear ID page suitable for the purpose of identifying the horses.

## PASSPORTS General Regulations Article 137

## For all Horses FEI Passports/FEI Recognition Cards issues, please address to your National Federation

All Horses competing at FEI Events must be registered with the FEI.

FEI Passports or FEI Recognition Cards - for those Horses with a national passport approved by the FEI, are compulsory for FEI Events, with the exception of CNs and CIMs as outlined below.

Athletes whose Horse's Passport and/or Recognition Card is not correctly validated, or failing to meet other requirements for vaccination and Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication control (Veterinary Regulations Article 1030) will be **subject to Sanctions in accordance with Annex II of the Veterinary Regulations**.

Athletes will be required to write their name and counter sign next to any passport irregularity entry noted, as an acknowledgement, prior to receiving the passport and leaving the show ground. Following a warning being issued for such an irregularity the Athlete will have 30 days to correct this, failure to correct such irregularities within 30 days will result in a sanction being imposed.

Note for Horses permanently resident in a Member State of the European Union, all Horses must have a national EU passport in compliance with EU Regulations, to which a FEI Recognition card is applied. The exception to this being Horses in possession of an FEI passport which has been continually revalidated without interruption.

### VACCINATIONS - EQUINE INFLUENZA 2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1028

Horses competing at FEI Events must comply with the requirements for Equine Influenza vaccination in accordance with the Veterinary Regulations and as summarised below.

Exceptions to the requirement for FEI equine influenza vaccinations currently exist only for those Horses competing at CNs or CIMs where there are no national requirements for influenza vaccination in both the Event host country and the Horse's country of origin (General Regulations Article 137).

## **EXAMINATION ON ARRIVAL 2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1032**

On arrival at an Event venue all Horses must undergo an examination by a veterinarian to confirm their identification from their passport, their vaccination status and general health. To protect all horses attending events, any Horse with a questionable health status, with regards to vaccination, disease or other concerns, must be stabled within the isolation facilities provided by the Organising Committee pending a decision on entering the venue.

## **HORSE INSPECTIONS 2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1033**

All Horses will be assessed for their orthopaedic fitness to compete during the Horse Inspection. Any Horse demonstrating questionable fitness may be referred to the Holding Box for further veterinary examination. Horses not deemed fit not to compete will be eliminated by the Ground Jury and not be permitted to continue in the competition.

#### LIMB SENSITIVITY EXAMINATION

All Horses competing at the Event are subject throughout the Period of the Event to Examination under Article 1034 of the Veterinary Regulations, the Limb Sensitivity Protocol. The objectives of the Protocol are to: (i) safeguard the welfare of the horse, according to the principles outlined in the Code of Conduct for the Horse, and (ii) to ensure a level playing field for all Athletes. Horses are not eligible to compete when a limb, or part of a limb, is hyposensitive or hypersensitive. Hypersensitive limbs have an excessive or abnormal reaction to palpation. Hyposensitive limbs include any alteration in sensitivity induced by a neurectomy or chemical desensitisation for as long as the alteration in sensitivity persists.

Horses may be examined under the Protocol at any time during the Period of the Event, including, but not limited to, between rounds and before the Jump Off and they may be examined once or on multiple occasions. All Horses selected to be tested must submit promptly to the Examination or are subject to immediate Disqualification. There is no obligation to examine any specific number of Horses during the Event.



# 6. EQUINE ANTI-DOPING AND CONTROLLED MEDICATION 2013 Veterinary Regulations, Chapter VI EQUINE ANTI-DOPING AND CONTROLLED MEDICATION PROGRAMME (EADCMP)

Within FEI Groups I & II, the Organising Committee should charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 towards the cost of the EADCMP, which is affected by the FEI Veterinary Department.

#### **SAMPLING**

All horses competing at FEI Events may be subject to sampling for the presence of FEI Equine Prohibited Substances in accordance with the FEI Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Regulations (EADCMRs). Horses may be selected for sampling in accordance with obligatory testing, targeted or random sampling procedures (2013 Veterinary Regulations Article 1058).

#### **CLEAN SPORT INFORMATION**

The current FEI Equine Prohibited Substances List of Banned Substances and Controlled Medications is available on the FEI Clean Sport website: <a href="www.FEICleanSport.org">www.FEICleanSport.org</a> as a PDF document, database or smart phone app. Detection times are also provided for a limited number of Controlled Medication substances where available.

Elective Testing may be carried out, by Competitors for their Horses, prior to an Event to check for the presence of prohibited substances (please refer to <a href="www.FEI.org/veterinary">www.FEI.org/veterinary</a> for information and details).

## 7. <u>VETERINARY TREATMENTS</u>, <u>SUPPORTIVE AND OTHER THERAPIES 2013</u> Veterinary Regulations Chapter V

Veterinary treatment or supportive therapy required during an Event is under the control of the FEI Veterinary Official (Veterinary Delegate) and only permitted when:



- a) authorised using the appropriate Veterinary Form (see table below, or VRs article 1047-1051), either prior to the competition or prior to administration once the competition has begun;
- b) conducted within the designated Treatment Boxes and
- c) administered by an FEI Veterinarian (VRs article 1003) or Other Treating Professional (VRs article 1021).

Heated or magnetic blankets, physical therapy, ice and cold water, non-prohibited, authorised substances that are administered orally or by nebulisation, or those treatments exceptionally authorised by the Veterinary Delegate are allowed in the Horse's own stable.

Supervision of all such treatments by FEI Officials may take place directly on a random check basis or by requesting to see a copy of the relevant authorisation. No treatments may take place without coming under such control and authority, except in the case of a clear emergency, when a retrospective authority may be considered if the Horse is to continue.

### 8. <u>VETERINARIANS AT EVENTS</u>

2013 Veterinary Regulations, Chapter II

#### **VETERINARY SERVICES MANAGER (VSM)**

All Organising Committees must appoint a FEI Veterinarian as a Veterinary Services Manager to be responsible for assisting the organiser in achieving the Minimum Veterinary Standards and facilities required for an FEI Event. The VSM must ensure sufficient numbers of treating veterinarians are available for the type of Event and the number of Horses attending. The VSM may be the event treating veterinarian themselves.

#### **FEI VETERINARIANS**

All veterinarians treating Horses during FEI Events, including Team Veterinarians, Athlete's Private Veterinarians and Treating Veterinarians must be registered with the FEI as FEI Veterinarians – either Permitted Treating or Official Veterinarians. Veterinarians must carry their FEI ID Card with them at all times when in attendance at Events and must present this on the request of FEI Stewards or Officials. Athletes are advised to ensure that any veterinarian they wish to treat their Horse during an Event is registered in the correct way with the FEI.

Registering as an FEI Veterinarian does not give any automatic right to having accreditation which is issued by the event Organising Committee.

#### 9. NOTES TO ORGANISING COMMITTEES

FEI Veterinary Delegates must verify that adequate facilities and services are provided by the Organising Committee prior to the start of the Event, and ensure that FEI Stewards are aware of the requirements for the authorisation of Veterinary Forms, other treatments and the FEI Veterinarian ID Card during Events.

Organising Committees must also ensure that there are adequately trained stewards or designated individuals who will liaise with FEI Veterinary Officials to assist with the supervision of treatment areas. The Veterinary Forms 1-4 must be kept by the FEI Veterinary Delegate, referenced and submitted in their report to the FEI within 72 hours.

## X. HUMAN ANTI-DOPING

At a minimum, and pursuant to the ADRHAs, Organisers must provide the following at Events where human anti-doping testing is scheduled to take place at least 2 months prior to the Event:

- **1**. One (1) staff member able to act as point of contact and coordinator for the *Doping Control Officers* (*DCOs*) with the contact name and details of this staff member to be communicated to the *FEI* at least two (2) weeks prior to the starting date of the *Event*.
- **2.** Human anti-doping facilities reasonably separated from public activity, consisting of:
- -one (1) private room exclusively dedicated for use by the DCOs with one (1) table, two (2) chairs, pens and paper and one (1) lockable fridge; and
- a waiting room/area with a suitable number of chairs as well as an appropriate amount of individually sealed, non-caffeinated and non alcoholic beverages, which includes a mix of natural mineral water and soft drinks; and
- one (1) private and clean bathroom/toilet, adjacent or as near as possible to the *DCO* room and waiting area.
- **3.** Staff members (or volunteers) of both genders, able to act as *Chaperones*. The number of *Chaperones* available to the *OC* must be communicated to the *FEI* as early as possible following receipt by the *OC* of the *Testing* plan for the *Event*. Please see the qualifications for Chaperones in the ADRHAs.

If there is a tie for points among athletes for the Final, the result of the second qualifier will count and if there is a further tie for points among the same athletes the results of the first qualifier will count. Should there be a further tie still, then athletes will be placed according to their time in the first round of the  $2^{nd}$  competition.

Athletes start this competition with zero penalties. The starting order of this competition is the reverse order of the points obtained in the  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  Competitions (Places 16 to 1).

A competition against the clock but in the event of equality of penalties for the first place there will be a jump-off against the clock. Other athletes will be placed according to their penalties and time in the first round.

Prizes in kind as well as trophies and certificates will be offered for all athletes. FEI medals will be presented to the top ten finishers. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*
